## The Challenge of Waiting

Just a few weeks ago, people from many countries at the migrant shelters in Juarez, including at Frontera de Gracia (the Border of Grace), were waiting in Mexico to cross the border legally into the United States. They had migrated from hardship, scarcity, and danger in their home countries, including Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras, Haiti, and Guatemala, risking their lives along the way. At the beginning of this month, Pastor Samuel at the Border of Grace received some good news through a local agency, that a large number of cases of migrants was about to be "called up" and allowed to process their immigration petitions in the USA, and it would include a couple dozen of the shelter's current guests. He rushed to get to the shelter and give the news when all would be together at dinner time. People shouted for joy when they heard it: that finally, the day had come to cross the border! They jumped up and down, and children and parents alike began to dance at the great news. They gave thanks to God! Parents explained to their children that in a couple of days, the bridge would open that would take them to the United States, the 'country of dreams', they exclaimed.

The shelter residents said, "we need to celebrate this!" Let us buy everything to make "carne asada" (barbecued meat, a special treat!) for all! Pastor Samuel said, of course, let's do it! Because we are leaving on Saturday, Wednesday night will be a good day to celebrate. Wednesday arrived, early in the morning Samuel received a message, but didn't pay attention because he needed to buy a few things for the party tonight. When he arrived at the shelter people were preparing the food. People were so happy that many of them took the day off from their work, and some of them gave away the things they don't need for the next season. Everything was looking up!

At noon, Pastor Samuel found out that a policy change had been announced, and the anticipated case intake was canceled for those set to cross on Saturday. Now what? How could he break the news, this terrible news to those who have been waiting for months at the border? How can he help parents explain to their children that the bridge will not open for them to cross to the other side, that instead of dreams, their immigration nightmare will

go on still? He asks a friend to talk to them, and with them, he calls other pastors for advice and prayers, 'how do you do this?' This is so painful. How would you stop a celebration? How would you stop a dream before it can unfold?

After a couple of hours, he arrived at the Border of Grace shelter, and with a friend beside him, they broke the news. The border is closed. Nobody will cross the bridge. I am sorry for this! THE PEOPLE WERE SILENT! There was no word for a minute. drips of tears came from the adults, and children stood watching their parents and the people around and they began to cry too "y al verlos llorar lloramos" (At seeing them cry, we cried too) said Pastor Samuel. The food that was being prepared stood there, the appetites were gone, the music and party faded away, and like the darkness of night, uncertainty moved in to extinguish the light of their dream to walk across the bridge. All our people will remain in Mexico for now. How long? We don't know.

What would you pray for our brothers and sisters? Is there a word that will heal these hearts?

Hasta cuando señor tu justicia vendra? (How long, O Lord, until your justice comes?)

Friends, please pray for parents and children as they continue waiting at the border. and they had lunch the very next day to catch up. Kathy says, "It was heartwarming, and I am grateful for an ongoing connection!"

It is so exciting to hear these stories of connection and how our mentoring is making a difference!

## TRC Finances through September

Having completed three-quarters of the church fiscal year, we are in a very favorable financial position as of the end of September. Here's the good news-

1. **Overall:** From an overall perspective, we are in a very positive position financially—our net revenue (revenue minus expenses) on September 30 is \$51K better than last year at the same point and \$84K better than we budgeted.

- 2. **Giving:** Contributions to the general fund year-to-date (\$655K) are \$20K higher than last year (up 3%) and \$30K better than budget.
- 3. **Expenses:** Our expenses have been well-controlled. Overall expenses are \$28K less than last year and \$31K less than budgeted.
- 4. **Operating cash:** At the end of September, we had a balance of \$170K in our operating account. This is higher than we have typically experienced at this time of the year and represents about seven weeks of operating expenses.
- 5. **Reserve accounts:** In addition to our operating cash, we have \$140K set aside in reserve accounts for future expenses (building maintenance, personal memorials, etc.).
- 6. **Investment/endowment accounts:** We have several endowment accounts from which we are able to draw 5% annually to fund mission shares (Mission Memorial Fund) and unbudgeted building and programmatic expenses (Future Fund). At the end of September, these funds totaled almost \$1.1M. However, the value of those funds has dropped over \$300K since the first of the year due to market performance.

And here is the challenge for the remainder of the year: from now through the end of December, *we need to receive \$350,000 in contributions to achieve our approved budget for the year.* In 2021, we received \$364,000 during October-December.

We can do it again if everyone plays their part.

While things remain positive at the moment, the challenge for the future is that our reserves are inadequate for the facility and programmatic needs we see on the horizon. You've heard preliminary discussions on the need to address our HVAC system and have seen the program vision consistory has been reviewing. We will discuss these items at an upcoming congregational meeting in November to bring you up-to-date and review their implications.

In the coming week, you will be receiving a summary of your giving through the end of September. It will help you see where you stand for the year as well as provide the church with an opportunity to correct any errors or answer any questions about your giving before year end.

Thank you for the generous way you have supported the ministry of Third Reformed Church.
