Personally, I have never been a great host. Whenever guests come, attending to coats, table placements, and asking the proverbial question, "would you like anything to drink? We have..." are frequently forgotten. Now, this is not to say that I don't think about others, but just operate from the mindset of "what is mine is yours," if you would like a drink the refrigerator is open!

Honestly, this isn't very hospitable (and is something that I am working on). Assuming that individuals would take the initiative in a new place and context is presumptuous and vain. But how often do we do this?

How often do we just assume that people would feel welcome? Or that they should learn to feel welcome on their own? How often do we have our guests "set the table" for themselves?

Over the past few days, since my trip to Juarez, Mexico and Frontera de Gracia, I have been thinking about the scriptural idea of hospitality. What does it mean to be hospitable? And more specifically, what does it mean to "set the table" for our guests? In the book of Genesis, Abraham offers us an example of hospitality: "God appeared to Abraham at the Oaks of Mamre while he was sitting at the entrance of his tent. It was the hottest part of the day. He looked up and saw three men standing. He ran from his tent to greet them and bowed before them. He said, 'Master, if it pleases you,








stop for a while with your servant. I'll get some water so you can wash your feet. Rest under this tree. I'll get some food to refresh you on your way, since your travels have brought you across my path" (Gen. 18:1-5, MSG).

In this scene, Abraham "sets the table" for these strangers. He doesn't know who they are, only we are privy to the identity of his guests. Abraham just does what he can: He sets the table, allowing *foreign* spaces to become *shared* spaces!

One individual that we met in Juarez, the director of a government organization tasked with assisting migrants coming into the city, mentioned that the idea of "setting the table" and transforming our space into shared spaces to be the most important aspect of welcoming the stranger or other. He mentioned that in the midst of changing policies and political landscapes at the border, the one constant is our ability to open up our table and set it. Transforming our table and space into a shared table and space, allows for relationships to be built, and the love of God to be shown. We do not have to provide the context of our "meals" together or why we are gathering in the first place, that comes naturally once space is provided. Our call is to open our space and "set the table" because isn't that what Jesus asks for when he says, "Zacchaeus, hurry down. Today is my day to be a guest in your home" (Luke 19:5-7, MSG).



What if those writing the stories down were still just as awestruck as we were when we first heard it?

Did you hear what the shepherds said? Is the promised Messiah really here? Could it really be true?

When the early church was looking for words about what was happening in their midst, they leaned into the prophets. They turned back to the scriptures to remind themselves of the hope God gave them when they were in their darkest moments of exile. When things were still being formed, the faithful found the echoes of those that had gone before to ground them in what God was doing in their midst.

Do we still hear the echoes of the scripture in what God is doing among us?

Are we still open enough to hear it? Are we willing to unplug from all the other distractions and listen to the echoes of the prophets again as they call to us to remember the promise of Emmanuel?

Join us this Advent and Christmas as the prophets speak to us again of the promise of the Messiah.

Consistory Update for November 2022

Hey Friends,

Last night the consistory of the Third Reformed Church met. Janelle led us in a reading of Isaiah 66 and asked us to listen for what we heard of God and what we heard about ourselves. After devotions, we received our reports. One of the reports was from the financial team. Jeff Beird gave us a verbal report of our current financial picture which continues to trend in a positive direction. Consistory encourages you to remember Third Church in your year end giving to help us finish strong.

After the financial report, the consistory approved the budget that was presented to the congregation at our meeting this past Sunday. The budget was approved unanimously.

Next, the consistory took up the matter of the Housing Logistics Team. Team was one of the teams proposed in the vision document that would have a holistic approach to helping our people with housing at TRC. The summary from the vision document is:

This team will work on the housing needs in Holland by thinking both on a small scale like sustaining the homes that we own, finding living solutions for some of our members and so forth, as well as the large scale by researching ideas such as buying new homes, providing emergency shelter in the church basement, buying an apartment building, and/or partnering with community organizations.

This team will be formed over the next few weeks to begin a feasibility study of housing people that need shelter here at TRC, as well as investigating other options for their housing needs. This group will also attend to the houses that TRC already owns and develop strategies to work with those families for support as well. When the names of that group are finalized, the consistory will be invited to affirm the group and form the team.

The consistory closed with prayer.
