## Disability Concerns

Amy Kenny, the author of "My Body is Not a Prayer Request" and speaker at the Calvin University January Series this year, is very critical of the way many people think of and treat people with disabil- Place for volunteers to help serve, make egg casseities. Many assume that disabilities can be overcome by praying enough or getting the right medical treatment, that normality can always be achieved. Some people are assumed to be faking their condition. Some have commented that she should bathe with Epsom salts to draw out the disability or try jogging (she uses a cane or wheelchair to move.) Other comments she has received: "You'll be healed if you just believe." Others say they feel uncomfortable seeing her." I'd rather be dead than disabled."

She attended a school that had a large campus, which caused her to be 3 minutes late for class and get many tardy slips. One day a week she would be put through many painful and ineffective treatments in a laboratory and treated with little concern for how she hurt. At the department of motor vehicles applying for a disability plate the employee said she doubted Amy would be able to drive.

She has critical comments about how churches relate to people with disabilities. When the Americans with Disabilities Act was being developed, church leaders lobbied for and received exemptions because it would impose burdensome costs and needless injury to their religious exercises.

Kenny discusses a number of issues Christians have had and still do concerning disability as punishment for sinning. She cites the story in John 9 about Jesus healing the man born blind, explaining that the man or/his parents sinning caused the blindness, but that "the works of God should be made manifest."

She writes at length about the idea that people with disabilities may retain the condition in the afterlife, sensing that it is so much a part of their existence. Also, there is the question of whether God suffers.

For people interested in discussing her book there will be a series of zoom meetings in February and March. A number of free print, electronic or audio copies of the book will be available. If interested please let me know.
