One additional note on Care Elders: The consistory approved a new model for congregational care last month that included a restructuring of our care elders. This restructuring plan was published in our March 23, 2023 edition of Third Church News. You can access the proposal information at the end of this issue that was included in that issue.

This means that the number of care elders we needed this year was a bit in flux. At the April 18 meeting, one care elder agreed to be a quadrant leader and the others are either remaining care elders in their current role, retiring from their term or choosing to not renew their term. The nominations committee is hard at work filling the needs of the care elders for the next term and the care elders themselves are hard at work building the lay congregational care team. The list of names for care elder will come before the congregation for approval at a later date.

Consistory Update for April 2023

Opening Devotions:

After the candle was lit and the opening litany spoken, Pastor Ryan read from John 20:19-31, using the First Nations Version of the New Testament. I really appreciate this translation because of the unique names it uses for familiar biblical characters: Jesus, for example, is "Creator Sets Free" and "Wisdomkeeper." It helps us see familiar passages and stories in a fresh, revealing way.

Pastor Ryan reminded us that, like Thomas, we too need evidence of his presence more than we like to admit. However, we need to realize that we've been "seeing" Jesus all along in "the least of these among us" and in the "nail holes of a punctured world." We need to get better at seeing Him among us.

Items for Information:

It's clear that Third Church's committees are active and making decisions and recommendations. Consistory approved the many, many pages of minutes in our packet.

Items for Discussion:

- 1. We began with a financial update from Jeff Beird, who has a gift for telling the financial truth in a way people like me can understand. It was a tough quarter for Third Church. After a rough January, things improved in February and March. He commended the staff for keeping expenses in check and said to all of us that, well, we need to give more. Shelby Next has fixed the software problem that messed up our statement at the end of last year. Jeff concluded by informing us that Meyaard, Tolman, and Venlet, a tax firm in Zeeland, will complete an audit for us next year.
- 2. The Housing Team has been hard at work and will present their final report at our next Consistory meeting.

- 3. A motion was presented to change our bylaws to read: "VIII: The fiscal year shall be July 1-June 30th." This will also be presented at our May congregational meeting.
- 4. There was an HVAC update (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning System-it's a new acronym for me and might be for some of you as well). We have a proposal from Elzinga-Volkers for a courtyard wall leak for \$6,725.00. Amy Lunn clarified that this was not part of the HVAC proposal but will really help with the water and drainage problems we've had in the basement. It will be referred to our Property Committee.
- 5. We discussed the proposal from the newlyformed Creative Expressions Team (a.k.a., the old "Worship Committee"). Their idea is for setting aside a space at Third for creative people who would enhance our worship through their contributions in visual, musical, and verbal art (and any other art forms). For a small stipend and a space to work in, Joel Schoon-Tanis would oversee the effort and pull in our other artists, musicians, writers to help enhance our worship and life at Third Reformed Church. Maybe an artist at Third could teach a course in design, or a writer could teach one in composing prayers. It's a creative and novel idea for this artistic old church at 12th and Pine, and I got excited thinking about how it could engage young and old at Third in ways we haven't tapped yet. A rich discussion ensued, looking at the benefits and possible drawbacks of such a proposal. This will be taken up again at our next meeting.

Items for Decision:

- The Nominations Committee, of which I am a happy part, made a motion to have a Congregational meeting on May 7th to approve our new Consistory selections.
- 2. A motion was made by the Nominations Committee for Lucia Torres to be given an exemption so that she may serve as a Deacon for TRC. She has been a faithful member beyond the two -year requirement, but joined us during COVID. The motion was unanimously and joyfully approved.

3. The Nominations Committee made a motion to approve the following list of nominees for approval at the May 7th congregational meeting. For Deacon: Laura Baer, Bethany Bulthuis, Lucia Torres, Sandy Stielstra, and Jeff Voskuil. For Governing Elders: Carl Folkert, Harold Gazan, Mary Toppen-Palma. All I can say is, thank you, Lord, for giving us such an amazing group of saints, old and young, to help lead us into the next couple of years. It's a comfort to know such people continue to step up at Third, year after year. The motion was, of course, unanimously approved.

Pastor Ryan closed the meeting the way it began, in prayer. And I walked away, once again, grateful to be part of the Third way.

Proposal: Reorganizing Care Elders & Envisioning a Congregational Care Team (CCT) (Revised)

The following reorganization is proposed for future Care Elders offices, and development of a network of lay congregational care at Third Reformed Church:

Reasons:

To reduce the burden of nominations and recruitment for 16 care elder positions

To reduce the burden of meetings regarding governance to which care elders may be obligated as voting members of the Consistory

To allow spouses eager to serve to be on the consistory, without hindering gifts for caring that a family member could offer.

To allow for new church members to participate earlier than the requisite two years of membership for installation in offices, and hopefully better prepare a pool of future care elders who are experienced and knowledgeable.

To allow for development within our congregational care model that includes, and ministers to Spanish speaking participants at Third, by Spanish speaking members and adherents.

Care Elders

4 Care Elders, nominated and elected according to existing procedures. Each would lead a Congregational Care Team of 3 lay persons, serving as a Quadrant Coordinator. The Care Elders would hold the full responsibilities of consistory membership including meeting attendance (both Care Team meetings and full consistory), voting, opportunities to participate in working committees, and serving communion.

[Those currently serving as a Care Elder through June 2025 will maintain all rights and responsibilities as members of the consistory, and will transition to the greater consistory upon the end of term.]

Care elders will be asked to participate a minimum of once during their term in an annual (or every second year) review of membership rolls, (approx. 2 meetings, + calls and communications) OR nominations committee (approx. 2 meetings plus calls and communication).

Congregational Care Team

4 teams of at least 3 active members of the congregation would be nominated and approved by consistory to participate in the ministry of caring for our congregation through visitation, phone calls, as well as written messages, meals or other forms of support as worked out in the quadrant care team under leadership of a care elder.

Congregational Care Team (CCT) participants would be asked to serve a minimum of two years.

Procedure

The Nominations Committee will provide names of nominees for CCT to the consistory for its approval, in tandem with the annual nominations process for consistory officers.

Emphasis would be given to placing team members in the quadrant where they live if that is a preference, and if possible, based on willing nominees.

Expectations for Congregation Care Team Participants

The CCT should meet 4-6 times per year under the coordination of the pastors and Care Elders.

Care Elders will attend monthly meetings for care elders.

CCT: At least 4 quadrant meetings, led by a care elder with their specific CCT.

This would include responsibility to pay visits, make phone calls for all many of recognizing life occasions, to offer celebration, sympathy, prayers and support on behalf of the congregation. Manner of support may be reflective of a CCT participant's own gifts and interest to offer to others (i.e., baking bread; English tutoring; celebrating a sports or music achievement for students, etc.) CCTs should prioritize making use of Shelby Next for recording care notes and updates. Training will be provided at the annual consistory orientation meeting, and tech support available as needed. This provides helpful information to elders and pastors for pastoral care. Our goal is-Ongoing, regular, interactive contact to be recorded for as many members of quadrant as possible throughout the year.

Occasionally, under the coordination of the Care Elders (and/or pastors) a CCT may be asked to help organize particular support to meet the needs of members. This can include, as one is able, meal delivery/organizing, transportation, or help around the home/yard. A protocol and suggestions will be offered during the annual consistory orientation workshop.
