October Financial Update: Steady As She Goes

After the volatility of our giving throughout the summer, our finances have settled into a more normal pattern. Through the end of October, our overall income is \$5K higher than the comparable period last year while our expenses are just \$1400 higher. That gives us net revenue that is \$4K better than July-October in 2022.

Just a reminder as you look at the numbers below that we have switched our fiscal year from a calendar year to a program year (July-June). Thus we are just four months into this fiscal year without a looming budget year-end in front of us. Also for perspective, we typically run a deficit most months from January through October before calendar year-end giving provides the cash to manage the deficits in the ten months that follow. Thus the deficits you see below are planned within our budget for this year. That overall summary for this budget YTD looks like this:

Within these numbers, there are a couple items of note:

- While our overall income is up \$5K over last year, contribution income is up \$19K (+6.4%).
- Our physical plant expenses, especially utilities, are running well below last year (-\$10K).

With the deficits YTD, our cash balance in the operating account has dropped to less than \$100K (sufficient for cash flow through the end of the year, but 17% below the long-term average balance at this point of the year).

Thanksgiving Offering Designated for Community Action House Food Club



Food Club is a membershipbased grocery store run by Community Action House. It provides choice, flexibility,

and access to healthy foods to families in need, along with membership perks and support at the Opportunity Hub.

Since Food Club's opening two years ago:

- 4,267 families accessed fresh, healthy groceries
- 2,000,000 meals-worth of groceries have been provided
- 558 volunteers have dedicated time and talent at Food Club
- 32,158 referrals were made to helpful community resources
- 600+ guests attended heath and nutrition classes

The Thanksgiving Day offering has been designated to support this important work done by Community Action House.

- Our Christmas Eve Service and Children's Pageant is at 7:00 PM, and volunteers will again be needed to help put out cookies and punch, etc. This year there's only one Christmas Eve service because it is on a Sunday.

Living Green

Have you noticed these past few years how powerful the wind has been as the different fronts come in? I sure have. They seem to be more frequent and much stronger. Sure makes dealing with the leaves this time of year a challenge doesn't it? With that in mind I came across a nice article from Earth911 entitled, "A Kid's History of Wind Energy." To read the entire article, just visit Earth911.com and search that title (might even be useful for some extra credit in school). For now, I thought I'd just highlight some of the interesting facts in timeline fashion.

- The first ideas about windmills date back to Babylon almost 3700 years ago.
- The famous Dutch windmills were adapted from Muslim designs to help pump water.
 - Wind has been harnessed to produce electricity since 1887.
- James Blythe developed a simple turbine to power his cottage. He was the first to use wind to drive an electric generator.
 - He tried to get a nearby village to use his idea to power their homes.
- They thought he was CRAZY thinking it was the work of the devil.

- His next windmill found a home at the Montrose Lunatic Asylum.
- Poul la Cour improved the windmill's efficiency when he discovered that fewer blades spinning faster was the best way to generate electricity.
- In 1927 brothers Joe and Marcellus Jacobs opened a factory in Minnesota to produce wind turbines selling them to farmers.
- In 1931 George Darrieus patented the "eggbeater windmill".
- In 1931 Yalta, a city in Ukraine, produced a very efficient horizontal wind generator, capturing about 32% of the wind's potential energy. By contrast, solar panels capture between 18 and 24% of the sun's potential energy.
- In 1945 the first mW turbine was built in Castleton, Vermont. and could power 1,000 modern homes.
- In 1956 Johannes Juul designed a 200ft tall turbine in Gesdar, Denmark.
- Nasa refurbished the Juul turbine and in 1980 the first wind farm was completed in New Hampshire
- In 1990 Denmark built the first offshore wind farm.
- In 1990 in Delabole, Cornwall, England, an onshore wind farm generated enough power for 2,700 homes with just 10 turbines.
- By 2003 the UK introduced its first offshore wind farm with 30 turbines along the coast of Wales.
- In 2020, the British government announced that they had reached a tipping point where renewable energy outperformed fossil-fuel energy at a lower cost.
- Wind turbine generation capacity is growing by an average of 7% per year.
- In 2023, the U.S. Dept. of Energy reported that 10% of electricity generated in the U.S. came from wind, enough to power 43 million homes.

I will leave you this month with a quote: "We are like tenant farmers chopping down the fence around our house for fuel when we should be using nature's inexhaustible sources of energy - sun, wind and tide....I'd put my money on the sun and solar energy. What a source of power!"—Thomas Edison
