Our offering Christmas Eve will benefit Resilience, formerly Women in Transition. Their mission is to respond to, reduce, and prevent domestic and sexual violence in Ottawa and Allegan counties.

Resilience has experienced a 36% increase in calls to its emergency hot line and a possible 30% decrease in its federal funding. This remarkable agency not only responds to victims of domestic violence with 24 hour crisis response, emergency and supportive housing, and follow up therapy, but focuses on prevention with a violence high risk program, and coaching healthy and respectful manhood in our local schools.

In last week's newsletter, it was reported that during the months of November and December, the church needs to receive \$260,000 in income over that critical two-month period to meet our financial goals. Through this past weekend (as of December 18) we have received \$251,467 toward that target. With two weeks remaining before month-end, it looks like we will achieve that objective and go into the new year in a healthy financial position to sustain ministry in the months ahead when revenues tend to fall short of our monthly expenditures.

Consistory Update for December

Before our meeting, several Consistory members met at 6 P.M. in the Fellowship Hall for a pizza dinner as well as a discussion of the book "Remembrance, Communion, and Hope," written by Western Seminary's J.Todd Billings.

Dr. Madison Pierce led our discussion of Chapters 3 and 4. While the book has been a challenge to read, our teacher clarified the more difficult Reformed theology about the Eucharist and showed how it is relevant to our ongoing discussion at Third. What continues to amaze some of us non-theologians is how different the reality of John Calvin's teachings, which tends toward wonder and mystery and grace, is from the somber, ruledriven view we imbibed as kids. Tough as the book is, it has led to rich discussions. Thank you, Madison!

Pastor Ryan opened the meeting with a devotional exercise the staff uses every Tuesday. It's called "Dwelling with the Word," and it involved the whole Consistory. Before Ryan read Isaiah 9:2-7 and then Angel read the same in Spanish, we were instructed to listen quietly to what the Holy Spirit was saying to us through this passage. Then, after some silence, each table shared with the person on their right, what they heard the Spirit speaking. Next, we shared with the whole group what the person on our right told us. For me, it was a moving example of how when we really listen to the Word and the Spirit and each other in community, we come to a deeper understanding of what God is trying to tell us.

As we began our items for discussion, Jeff Beird then shared the Financial Team Update, which was good news. We are ahead of where we were at this point last year and, as Jeff put it, "Things are getting incrementally better each month." While we can feel good about that, we also need to keep being generous in our giving.

Hunter Brumels, our Pastor of Youth Ministries, updated us on the Faith Formation Team's work. They have met weekly for a long stretch reading and discussing Walter Brueggemann's book "Prophetic Imagination," which Hunter enthusiastically recommends. The group's conclusion is that TRC needs to wrestle with this tension: How can we learn to lament the fact that we live in a post-Christian world while also being energized by the work of Jesus Christ in our lives?

Hunter assured us that the group was encouraged by how much Third is already doing about Faith Formation. (As a side note, I learned from Hunter after the meeting that we have a group of young people who meet weekly on their own at 6:30 A.M. for Bible study; we have another younger group meeting on their own to discuss how they can care for and improve the environment during the next week. That should fill us with hope!) When asked what actions might come out of this group's work, Pastor Ryan reminded us that the group was asked to form a faith-formation track that would go beyond youth to include adultsincluding how we "enfold" those who are new to Third. Pastor Janelle suggested it would be wise to let staff look closely at the group's report so that they can determine where we are doing well with faith formation and where we could do better. It was also suggested that some congregational input would be helpful.

Pastor Angel then introduced the "Maria y José Fund." Oh my. In a way only he can, he had us imagine the plight of an immigrant who, over the course of two or three weeks, travels— often by foot—from the southernmost countries of Central-America and arrives at the U.S. border exhausted, penniless, to wait for permission to cross into the U.S.A. Once they are granted such permission, they are often stunned at the vastness of our country—at the hundreds of miles they have yet to travel in order to be reunited with family or friends.

The "Maria y José Fund," is to help such folks on the final leg of their journey. It's an idea initiated by the members of our El Encuentro congregation. During Advent and Christmas their offerings will be directed toward this fund. Also, members of our 10 o' clock service can feel free to contribute as well.

Then, I reported on an idea from the Governing Elders to form a group we're calling "the Environmental Witness Task Force." Their mandate will be as follows:

- To create a plan that will challenge and guide TRC into the years ahead to place its responsibility and care for God's creation at the center of decision making regarding its environmental impact and energy footprint.
- To create measurable, challenging, and achievable environmental-impact and energy-reduction goals that will bear witness to our community that, especially as the climate warms, TRC takes seriously God's mandate to care for His creation.
- To submit their recommendation to the Consistory by April 1, 2024.

Consistory members were then asked to consider members of TRC who would be a good fit for this group and submit them to Mark Hiskes. The last item for discussion was the Consistorial Report from Holland Classis. Pastor Ryan read the dozen, or so, yes-or-no questions, urging us to feel free to respond or challenge. We responded "yes" to each question about whether we are living up to our Christian call here at the corner of 12th and Pine.

The one item for decision on our agenda, "Housing Allowance" for our pastors, wasn't detailed enough yet for a decision and was tabled until our next meeting.

Pastor Ryan closed the meeting with prayer.

But as we filed out, having flipped off the lights and locked the doors, we found a homeless brother, wrapped in a heavy blanket from head to toe, sleeping outside our main entrance. Of course Pastor Ryan and Pastor Angel knew him by name, as he knew them, and they quietly chatted and gently directed him to a place he could find a warm bed for the next night.

The grace and love they extended to him reminded me, once again, of two things worth remembering this Christmas season: that the opportunity to welcome the homeless Marys and Josephs among us confronts us daily at borders both far and near, and that we have a pastoral team who not only know that, but also quietly act as the hands and feet and heart of Jesus.

Just another reason to be grateful for the Third Way.

In this inspiring talk, Dr. Cox will detail new historical discoveries that reveal the ways that people of faith and the churches of the Revolutionary era were involved in moving those values forward, and how we can look to this past to give us hope for the future.



Anna-Lisa Cox is an award-winning American historian who specializes in the history of racism in the 19th century, with a focus on the North. Her recent book, The Bone and Sinew of the Land, on the long-denied history of African American pioneers who settled the Midwest before the Civil War, was honored by the Smithsonian Magazine as one of the best history books of 2018. Professor Henry Louise Gates Jr. praised it for being "a revelation



of primary historical research that is written with the beauty and empathic powers of a novel," and New York Times best-selling author Professor Ibram Kendi lauded it for being a "groundbreaking work of research."
