January Financial Update: Things Look Good!

Our financial picture continues to be positive as of the end of January. You may remember that we went into this fiscal year believing things were going to be tight and thus did some trimming of expenses in order to present a balanced budget. In that budgeting, we hoped to buy some time by reducing expenses for the year as we felt income would increase based on membership and giving trends that would put us back on track financially. We are now seven months into the fiscal year and I'm optimistic we can achieve our budget goals for the year.

Through the end of January, our income is \$43K over budget (+6.2%) and \$62K better than the comparable months last year (+8.7%). Meanwhile expenses are just \$6K over budget YTD (+0.9%) and \$32K under last year (-4.2%). As a result, our net revenue (income less expense) is \$37K better than budgeted and \$90K better than a year ago over the same period. (This picture is somewhat artificially positive, however, as we have \$32K in gifts received for the Maria y Jose fund and Frontera de Gracia that are recorded as income at year-end but have not yet been dispersed as of January 31.) The 1/31/24 numbers look like this:

We can be grateful that Third is doing as well as it is as that allows us to move forward in ministry without feeling strapped by our budget. Thanks for your generous support of the church.

Rowland and Jane Van Es St. Paul's University, Limuru, Kenya

Rowland and Jane Van Es are teaching at <u>St Paul's</u> <u>University</u> near Nairobi, Kenya (a leading worldclass chartered Christian University in Kenya), Jane as an instructor in Social Work and counseling, Rowland in the theology department. Like a number of East African countries, Kenya is both home to dynamic, growing churches and a great number of economic, political and social challenges. In their latest letter, Rowland and Jane note how these challenges are impacting students at St. Paul's:

> Due to rising external debt and pressure on the Kenyan currency, the government has reduced the number of student scholarships it gives to students at private universities like St. Paul's. This has reduced the number of students enrolled and forced the school to lay off many parttime lecturers. As a result, full-time teachers, like our colleagues and us, have to teach more than a full load (five classes). Some are experiencing burnout and/or spending less time mentoring students.

They also note that those who may want to help provide scholarships for students who are now unable to attend because of this financial crisis can do so through a scholarship fund that has been set up by the RCA to help. In this same letter, written soon after Rowland

and Jane returned to Kenya from a four-month home leave (including a visit to Third!), they listed the following prayer concerns. Please remember them in your prayers:



- Pray for the Kenyan economy that makes it harder for the government to sponsor students, harder for students and families to raise support, and harder to pay back their loans. .
- Pray for us as we return to Kenya after completing four months of home service that began in the Fall of 2023. Pray that we are refreshed and ready to make new relationships with our students.

Pray for the family we leave behind: Rowland's parents in their mid-80s, our two adult daughters living together in Holland, MI, and our siblings and their families scattered across the country.

Living Green

We often talk about plastic in Living Green. Why to cut back, the need to recycle, where and how to recycle and even what plastics can and cannot be recycled. Today however, we will focus on metal. Did you know there are two types of metal? Ferrous and non ferrous. Do you know how to tell them apart? That one is easy. If a magnet (any magnet will do) sticks to your metal it is a ferrous metal most likely steel. If your magnet doesn't stick to it you have a non-ferrous metal. Copper, aluminum, stainless steel and bronze are non ferrous metals.

Here in Holland, and I would assume in many communities, you have a couple of options to choose from when you have metal to recycle. You can choose to toss your metals into your curbside bin or if you'd like to make a little money you can take your metals to the Black River Recycling center off of Chicago drive.

If you're interested in making some money or maybe you have a large amount to recycle and decide to make a trip to Black River you again have a couple of options. You can decide to lump all of your metals together where they will pay you simply the steel price (since they will have to sort it) or you can go with your metals sorted to optimize your return. Copper is going to net you the largest return while brass comes in second with aluminum and stainless paying you roughly what steel will pay you.

There are a couple of things you need to know before you go.

1. They will recycle old propane tanks but you need to let them know that you have one (or more) and they will direct you as to where they

can go.

2. Do not for any reason include batteries in your metal recycling. Please recycle those at Batteries Plus or Lowe's

And finally a note... *Think before you snack! Food packaging and containers make up 31.4% of plastic pollution.*

Together we CAN make a difference.
