September 8

LITURGIES OF BELONGING

Alberto La Rosa, Assistant Professor of Theology and Ethics at Western Theological Seminary

This talk will explore two liturgies of belonging. One is a popular liturgy that is at play in many churches in the North American context, a liturgy that tries to cultivate a sense of belonging and home around a theology and practices that disconnect people from land, place, and culture. The other, alternative liturgy, is one that invites people into a shared sense of home and belonging in the world around a theology and set of practices that root us rather than displace us.

UNDERSTANDING THE Wanderers: Spiritual Yearners and Religious Dones

Daryl Van Tongeren, Associate Professor of Psychology at Hope College

The landscape of religion is changing in the United States. More people are leaving religion and seeking to meet their spiritual needs outside of traditional religion. This talk examines cutting edge research to better understand religious dones (those who have left religion) and spiritual yearners (those who still desire spiritual connection). Practical applications for people of all faith traditions will be discussed.

HOME, BITTERSWEET HOME Christy Berghoef, Contemplative Photographer, Worship Leader and Writer

Christy Berghoef was raised on a small 40 acre farm on the south side of Holland. Michigan. After decades away she moved back with her husband and four young children, raising them on the same land she grew up frolicking about barefoot with her hands in the dirt, the sun on her cheeks and the rain in her hair. But the challenges of moving back to a small community after her mind and heart had expanded to embrace new perspectives, brought a bitterness to the sweet nostalgia she was longing for, leading her to question the wisdom of coming home, wondering if home could ever really be home again. Through struggle and searching, she eventually rediscovered the beauty of home and found a way to navigate the hardship of home, fully settling herself into it.
