## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE CHRISTIAN REFORMED CHURCH?

Duane Kelderman, pastor in the CRC for over 45 years, serving for ten of those years as the Vice-President for Administration and Associate Professor of Preaching at Calvin Theological Seminary.

There has been great turmoil in our sister denomination, the Christian Reformed Church, over the past few years, which came to a head at the 2024 Synod with the decision that several congregations must disaffiliate from the denomination. The dividing issue is human sexuality, but the debate is particularly centered on the interpretation of the word "unchastity" in the Heidelberg Catechism. Duane Kelderman, a CRC minister who has been in the eye of the storm during these discussions, will lead our class.

## WHEN THE CHRIST BECAME "CHRISTIAN"

Dave Larsen grew up on Green Street, in the Englewood neighborhood of Chicago. Dave has written a fictionalized account of life in Englewood focused on one particular year, 1962, when both his neighborhood Christian School and Christian Reformed Church decided to leave Englewood and move to the suburbs. Dave's book humanizes the phenomenon of white flight and Dave will join
