RELIGION ON THE DOCK: WHAT A FAITH-FRIENDLY SUPREME COURT MEANS FOR THE CHURCH

Cases involving conflicts over the meaning of the 1st Amendment religion clauses have been a regular subject on the docket of the U.S.

Supreme Court in recent years. The Court has shown itself to be highly solicitous of religion, even as religious commitments and practice have steadily waned in America. We will review the most significant judicial decisions and consider their significance for the church.
